

LITTER FREE DORSET ANNUAL REPORT 2018-2019



Litter Free Dorset is made up of a group of local organisations, charities and community groups who all work together to reduce the social, economic and environmental impacts of litter. This is done by trying to stop littering behaviour in the first place through co-producing policy, projects and campaigns.

OVERVIEW

A full-time project officer (Sophie Colley) was recruited in June 2018 to manage Litter Free Dorset, this post was funded by Dorset Waste Partnership. Funding has been secured for this post until June 2020. Within the last year, Sophie has made strong relationships within the working group, developed numerous campaigns to impact littering behaviour across Dorset and built the Litter Free Dorset brand. This report includes some highlights from the last year and show cases how collaborative working is creating a partnership with impact, legacy and sustainability.

WEBSITE

The website has been re-designed and updated to create a website which; is super easy to navigate so that people can get involved with projects and campaigns, promotes our social media channels and attracts a younger audience as well as publicises our working partners.

SOCIAL & PRINTED MEDIA

Social media has been used throughout each campaign. LFD uses Twitter, Facebook and Instagram.



- Facebook is performing well- reaching on average 266 people per day which has increased from last year's 146 per day. The 'Don't Be A Tos5er' video released in February received 101 likes, 45 shares and reached over 6000 people.
- Twitter has also increased its reach throughout the year starting with 8000 monthly impressions in July 2018 to over 12,000 in June 2019.

We now have printed media for Litter Free Dorset including; a banner, gazebo, table cloth, business cards, shirts, hoodies and coffee cups!



DONT BE A TOS53R

This campaign was launched in November in partnership with Keep Britain Tidy aimed at those who toss their rubbish out of car windows. Litter Free Dorset implemented the campaign in targeted areas across Dorset. Research was taken prior to implementation to gather hotpots across the county (predominantly Weymouth).

Data was collected from the working group as well as Dorset Waste partnership which was collated, inputted onto a map and then analysed with other data such as areas of deprivation. Artwork was used on various medium such as billboards, bus stops, vehicles and social media.

The campaign targeted a younger audience by being installed in McDonalds Drive-thrus and been printed onto T-shirts by students at Bournemouth university.

By using 3 of the Dorset Waste Partnership's 'white vans' the message was viewed on a average of 500 times a day in Weymouth and Portland.

DEPOSIT RETURN SCHEME

In September 2018, Litter Free Dorset took part in the Green Clean campaign run by Campaign To Protect Rural England. A national litter pick campaign which aimed to highlight the amount of various drinking containers littered in our countryside. The data collected from community groups across Dorset went towards evidence that the UK's future Deposit Return Scheme should accept all drinking containers no matter what material or size.

In February Litter Free Dorset, children from Damers First School, and Campaign to Protect Rural England (CPRE) met Michael Gove to talk about the Deposit Return Scheme. The children asked Michael Gove questions and presented him with a list of golden rules for the new Deposit Return Scheme. The children were interviewed by Newsround and even had a tour of parliament.

HIGHSTREET CLEAN UP FUND

In March 2019 Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government announced a £9.75 million fund to enable local authorities to work with their residents on clean ups of Highstreets. Litter Free Dorset used this fund to work with communities across Dorset to support clean ups in their local area and develop projects to reduce litter. LFD worked with 16 communities across Dorset.

Litter picking equipment has been distributed to support groups which include Gillingham Litter Pickers, Wimborne War On Waste and Clean up Blandford. These groups took part in the Great British Spring Clean 2019.

Over 80 volunteers took part in the GBSC in Dorchester and collected 40 bags of litter in under 2 hours. Since this clean up a group has formed in Dorchester who wish to take part in clean ups on more of a regular basis. 'Clean up Blandford' had a large litter pick which is an annual event. This year the canoe club cleaned the river through the town. 'Clean Up Blandford' are helping to distribute equipment bought by the fund to local villages-Bryanston, Shillingstone, Spetisbury, Durweston & Pimperne so that they can do more community clean ups in the future.

Weymouth Town Council were given littering picking equipment for multiple 'Friends of' groups including 'Friends of Rodwell Trail' who do regular litter picks. Community members from Easton in Portland took part in a clean-up of France Quarry supported by Dorset Waste Partnership. The quarry links the local community to Easton Highstreet and is a daily footpath used by the whole community. The clean-up has helped a group develop who plan to litter pick regularly. The groups future involves creating a wildlife trail leading people towards Easton Highstreet and even establishing a community compost plot to combat fly-tipped garden waste.









The Highstreet fund has been used to purchase a Trommel for Swanage and other coastal towns who are situated next to the beach. This will help sieve the cigarettes and plastic nurdles from the beach whilst act as a community engagement tool for schools and youth groups. The Trommel has been called 'The Mary Dwen' named in honour of Mary Dwen who since 2010 has single-handedly and dedicatedly removed over half a million nurdles from Swanage beach, out of love for her native Purbeck coast and its wildlife. The Trommel has been gifted to Litter Free Coast and Sea.

The 2-minute litter pick board campaign has been implemented across Dorset. The boards encourage communities to do mini litter picks when they are out walking or popping to the shops. Towns that have implemented the campaign include; Weymouth, Dorchester, Wimborne, Ferndown, Shaftesbury and Bridport. Local businesses and organisations are supporting the campaign as board guardians for example in Weymouth these include; McDonalds, RSPB and the local BID (business improvement district). A review of the boards success will take place after summer.

RESOURCE HUB

This year Litter Free Dorset has begun to develop a library of resources to support organisations, communities, businesses and individuals to reduce litter, especially relating to single use plastic (SUP). Resources will include; schools' resources, toolkits on how to be 'Litter Free', template policies, and guides to 'Litter Free' events. All resources created will be available and promoted via the Litter Free Dorset website and link people to various partner organisations. The schools resources have been created in collaboration with DEED and and the tool-kits are being produced this summer.

SINGLE USE PLASTIC POLICY

Within the resource hub will be template policies for organisations and business who wish to reduce their waste and single use plastic. Litter Free Dorset are going to be setting up a task group within Dorset Council to reduce single use plastic in-house. The first step will be to create a task group and carry out an initial audit of Dorset County buildings and services. Once this has been done the task group will create a policy and action plan to make sure change takes place. Watch this space!

PLASTIC FREE COMMUNITIES

Many communities across Dorset are coming together to reduce single use plastic (SUP). Wimborne War On Waste are an amazing example of working with their local community and inspiring change long after achieving 'Plastic Free Status'. The Surfers Against Sewage initiative 'Plastic Free Communities' has encouraged many towns across Dorset to campaign together and urge businesses to reduce their SUPs by 3 items or more. Dorchester has just received 'Plastic Free' status, a campaign which has been led by Damers First School and supported by Litter Free Dorset and many others! We will all be celebrating in Borough Gardens on the 27th July 11am-3pm.



Campaign To Protect Rural England / Linda Williams

"Linda Williams and Dr John Larkin (Dorset CPRE Adviser on Minerals and Waste) represent Dorset CPRE at the Litter Free Dorset working group Meetings and find them a great way to share information and build relationships with community groups. Throughout September 2018, CPRE hosted a nationwide litter pick with local volunteers to help clean up litter from the countryside. Dorset CPRE in partnership with Litter Free Dorset arranged for the CPRE Reverse Vending Machine to visit West Dorset between 13th and 15th September as it toured the country. Volunteers were able to dispose of, and receive cash for, each of the drinks containers they pick, giving people a feel for how the national system will work and highlighting how financial incentives can help to boost recycling. The highlight was working with Damers First School on 14th September with Maddy from CPRE National giving a presentation to the children on how a deposit return system works in Norway. A joint litter pick with Thomas Hardye School with teachers also getting involved. CPRE Green Clean will return again in September 2019. Building on successes of 2018 with a community action focus this time."

"DWT have supported Litter Free Dorset by promoting and publicising events and campaigns to our members, volunteers and others linked to our extensive digital media; Promoting the Don't be a Tos53R campaign and events on our social media, including Facebook (liked by over 17,000 people) and Twitter eTheGreatHeath (1589 followers) eDorset Wildlife (29,700 followers), publicising Great British Spring Clean events 2019 on two of our e-newsletters -Great HeathWatch (over 900 recipients) and Volunteering alert (over 3000 recipients), promoting Don't be a Tos53R campaign and continuing to promote Bin Your Butt at the Urban Wildlife Centre and Chesil Beach Centre, including on car park bins there. Litter picking events have included; a litter pick on Upton Heath Nature Reserve, litter pick February 2019 with Keep Upton Tidy group and supported by the Urban Heaths Partnership. At Brownsea Island Nature Reserve, we did a beach/lagoon wall clean with our Friday volunteer work party. We removed 20 plus bags of rubbish plus fishing gear, fishing nets, plastic buckets, flip flops, plastic bottles, etc. At Kimmeridge and Worbarrow Bays, from April 2018 to March 2019 our beach clean stats are: 276 volunteers, 74 sacks of litter plus large items, 395.5kg in weight. This is from 8 corporate events plus 3 public events."

As the plastic issue generates increased awareness - the need for advise and discussion grows - The Resource Hub will help support those on their journey to decrease plastic use. The Resource Hub will be built upon throughout the next year to create a valuable resource for schools, businesses and the general public. Quick snappy videos will be used across our social media channels moving forward to promote The Resource Hub and the LFD brand.
